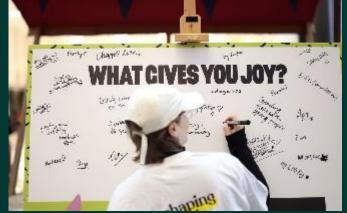


















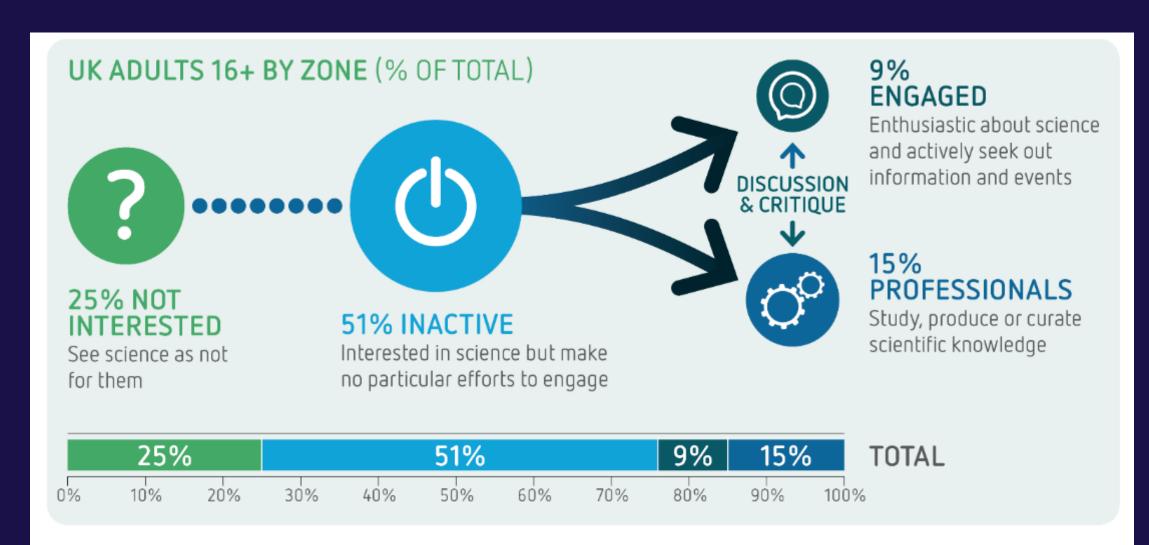
Our vision for the Festival is to:

- Showcase the transformative research and innovation taking place at the host University and the region.
- Support the host universities as hubs of inclusive engagement practice.
- Maintain the Festival's role as a sector-leader in inclusive science engagement for adults (over 16) who are under-represented in science.
- Establish a legacy for science engagement in the host city/region and facilitate lasting relationships between the host University, researchers, partner organisations, sponsors and the local community to enhance the universities' commitment to being strong civic institutions.

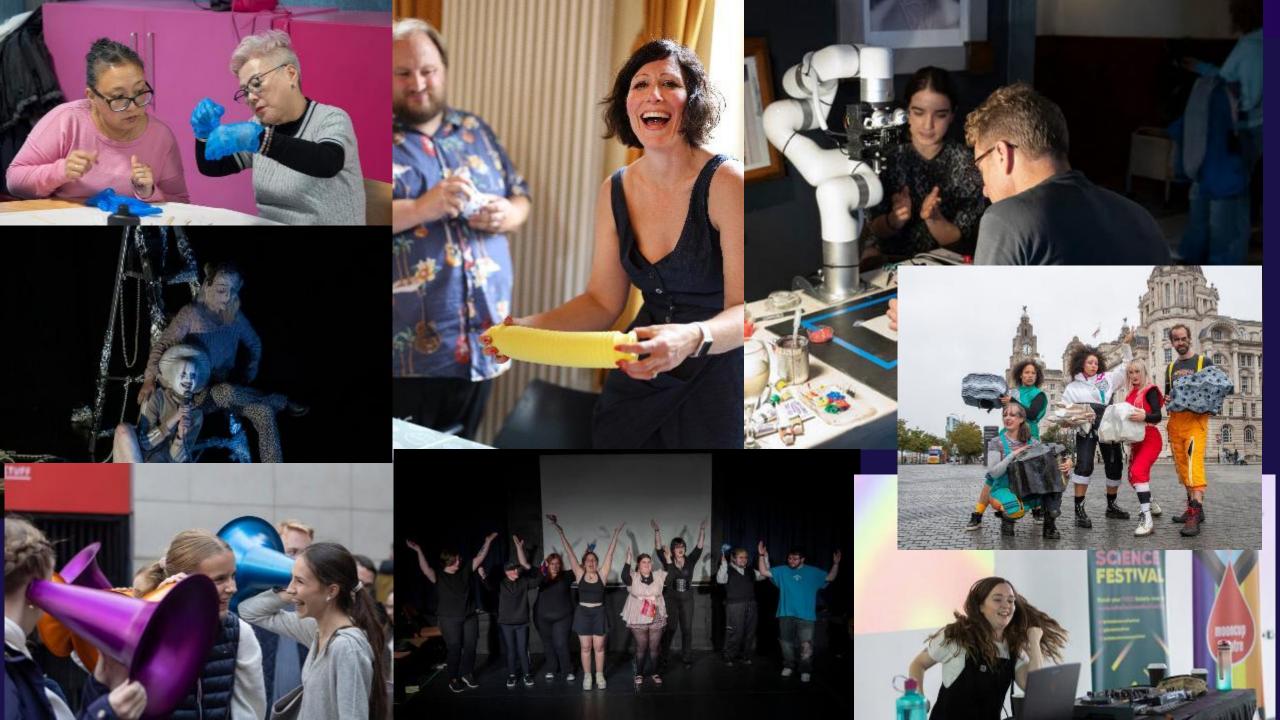
Festival target audience

- Adults with a broad interest in science, with a primary focus on the 16-to-34
 age group, in particular people who are not 'actively engaged' with science.
- People from backgrounds who are currently under-represented in science and research. We set benchmarks for audience diversity based on the demographics of the local area.
- We encourage attendance of daytime events by post-16 students from local schools, sixth form colleges and further education colleges and work closely with the host university to achieve this.

Festival programme

- Runs over 5 days in September between 80 to 100 free events/activities run in the university and across the city.
- Combines science and research with performance, art and technology talks, workshops, performances, local area venue take overs, immersive installations.
- At least a quarter of the events are sourced from the host university(s) through competitive
 call amongst academics and staff training is provided.
- Focus on partnership working and co-producing content with local audiences.
- Grants offered to local community groups that work with traditionally underrepresented audiences for them to run their own science activities/events.

Media coverage for BSF

We run a dedicated press programme for national and regional journalists which includes briefings, tours and access to speakers and events.

For the 2024 Festival in East London, we achieved 451 pieces of media coverage

This included coverage in the **Daily Telegraph**, **ITV News**, **The Times**, **Financial Times**, **Daily Mail** and **New Scientist**.
